Valerie Grace Wheeler learned that she had cancer when she was barely a teenager, having celebrated her 13th birthday a few short months before receiving the harsh news of her

diagnosis of metastatic Ewing's sarcoma.

Words seem inadequate to describe this exceptional young woman. Friends and family called her Val, while many called her "Amazing Grace." Astounding everyone with her determination, courage, positive attitude, and spiritual strength, Valerie touched hundreds of people throughout her experience with cancer. She died June 25, 1999, at age 15, before she could begin her sophomore year of high school.

Valerie was an honors student at Sam Rayburn High School, a talented artist, an outstanding athlete, and most of all, a person who had true compassion for others. Because of her faith in God, she believed in the hope that each new day could bring.
